Madeline Finn and the Shelter Dog



Madeline Finn and the Therapy Dog




Madeline Finn and the Blessing of the Animals





About Therapy Dogs

Therapy dogs visit libraries, hospitals, and schools. They visit nursing homes, and courthouses. Therapy dogs have even visited airports where they help passengers stay calm.

What is a therapy dog's job?

- to help people feel safe
- to let them know they're loved
- to remind them that they matter



To become a therapy dog, the dog and his handler must be certified. They must pass a series of tests. Good therapy dogs have calm, gentle personalities. They love to be petted. They are happy to lie down and hear a story. They must also be comfortable around other dogs since they are often working in groups.

Reading to Shelter Dogs

Many humane societies and animal shelters give volunteers the opportunity to read to their shelter animals. Often, animals are afraid when they arrive at a shelter. But hearing a calm, gentle voice helps them relax. They learn that it's okay to come to the front of the cage and interact with people. This is very helpful on adoption day!

Benefits of reading to shelter dogs:

- the animals are soothed by kind, gentle voices
- the animals are learning to trust again
- they are more adoptable which means they find their "Forever Homes" sooner




What Kind of Dog Can Become a Therapy Dog?

"Mr. Chips"

All kinds of dogs can make good therapy dogs—big dogs, small dogs, shelter dogs.

In Madeline Finn and the Shelter Dog, you met Mr. Chips. He was adopted from a shelter by Peggy, a retired school librarian, and has been doing therapy work for 10 years! They make a wonderful team.





"Boots"

You've seen Boots in all three books. She was abandoned outside of a shelter, but when Gloria adopted her, she knew right away that Boots was special. They have been doing therapy work together for 6 years.

Fun Fact: Boots gets a "munchkin" donut as a treat on her way home from the library!

"Chloe"



Fun Fact: Chloe lives with two other therapy dogs, Frost and Mickey. Sometimes they come to the library all together to hear the kids read to them.






Leaf Blessings

Ask an adult for help

Doggie Treats (peanut butter doggie cookies)

- 2 cups flour (white or wheat, if your pup has no wheat allergies)
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1/3 cup smooth peanut butter
- 1 tbs. honey
- 1/2 +bs. fish oil
- 1-1/2 cups water







Mix the flour and oats in a large mixing bowl. Pour in 1 cup of water, and blend until smooth. Add in the peanut butter, honey, and fish oil. Mix until well blended.

Slowly add the remaining water until mixture has thick, doughy texture. Roll dough 1/4" thick on floured surface.

Cut out with cookie cutters. Bake at 350° for 40 minutes.

Cool completely before serving.



Madeline Finn Star Cookies


(Not for dogs)

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2/3 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 +bs. milk
- 1-1/2 tsp. Vanilla



Sift first 4 ingredients together. In a separate bowl cream butter and sugar. Blend in egg, milk, and vanilla. Mix in dry ingredients. Chill in refrigerator for 2 hours. Roll dough 1/8" thick on floured board. Cut out with star-shaped cookie cutters. Bake at 375° for 8-10 minutes. Decorate after the cookies are cool!


